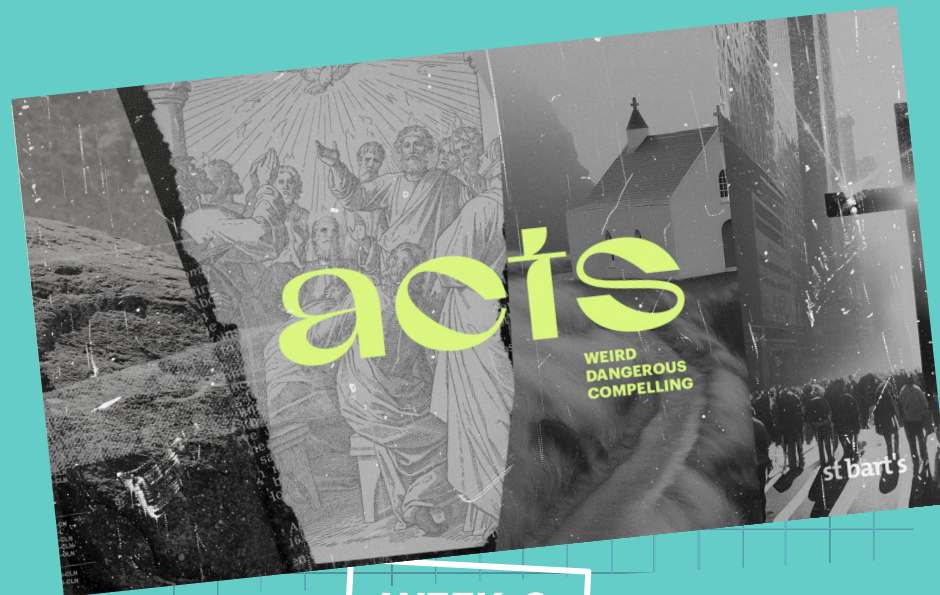

THIS WEEK'S FOCUS

Even though Jesus had changed their hearts the first Christians sometimes still argued and made mistakes. But they kept sharing God's love, showing that God can use imperfect people in his big story.

SERIES OVERVIEW

Strange Religion (Acts)

Whilst western Christianity can often look very similar to western culture, the very first followers of Jesus—along with their communities—were extraordinarily distinctive. Perhaps even a little weird! These new believers who were part of a new movement deviated from so many of the cultural norms and societal expectations. And in a culture in which everyone was 'religious', Christians still stood out as strange.

Yet whilst distinctive, these first Christians were also strangely compelling. As people witnessed their lives and heard their message, some were offended, others were confused, but many came to believe. In this eight-part series, we'll explore some of the earliest accounts of the church in Acts to see how the Gospel distinctively transformed these very first believers, also considering how the Gospel should continue to transform the lives of believers today.

TEACHING TIME

Transformed but Imperfect

It was exciting being part of the early church! Lots of people were believing in Jesus and becoming Christians.. Through the Holy Spirit, people were being healed. And they were being generous to one another and to others in the community. Some Christians were travelling to places quite a long way to share the good news with people there.. Barnabas and Paul were two of these missionaries.

But even though they were good friends and they both loved Jesus, this doesn't mean that everything went smoothly. Sometimes there were disagreements - really strong arguments.

One day, Paul and Barnabas were preparing to go on another trip together, But Barnabas wanted to take his cousin John Mark with them.

Paul said Absolutely not!'. He didn't trust John Mark because he had let them down once before on a missionary journey.

Even though Paul and Barnabas were good friends, they just couldn't find a way to agree. In the end, they decided to go on two separate journeys. Barnabas took John Mark with him in one direction, while Paul went a different direction with a new missionary, Silas. Two trips instead of one!

And so the Good News of Jesus kept spreading - in different places. And we know that from letters that Paul wrote later that he came to trust John Mark. too.

Just because we're followers of Jesus, it doesn't mean we're perfect. But God can use imperfect people - and help us to change. Even if we have hurt each other, God can help us to become good friends again. We can take the first step and show kindness. We might need to apologise.

And we can be sure that God can always bring good things out of difficult times when we obey him.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 3. But then they had an argument. What was the argument about?**
Barnabas wanted to take John Mark with them but Paul said 'No'.
- 4. What decision did they make?**
Barnabas went to Cyprus with John Mark; Paul went in another direction with a man called Silas.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Read Acts 15:36-41 (from SBK Lower Primary Scripture)

- 1. Have you ever had an argument with your best friend? How did you feel?** Talk about how it's natural that we might disagree - but we should always try to become friends again.
- 2. Paul and Barnabas were good friends - and they were missionaries together. What did they do as missionaries? (v36)**
They visited different places to share the good news about Jesus. And they wanted to visit one of those places again to see how the believers were going.
- 3. But then they had an argument (v37-38). What was the argument about?**
Barnabas wanted to take John Mark with them but Paul said 'No'.
- 4. Why did Paul say no (v38)?**
Because John mark had let them down on an earlier visit.
- 5. What decision did they make (v39-40)?**
Barnabas went to Cyprus with John Mark; Paul went in another direction with a man called Silas.
- 6. Even though they had had a big argument, how did God make good things happen (v41)?**
Now there were 2 teams - and they were both making sure that the Good News kept being spread.
- 7. Even when things go wrong, God can make good things happen. He is living in us helping us to live his way.**
Share an example from your own life about how this has happened. Encourage children to talk about how they can make up with their friends, or how God as helped them in a hard situation.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Read Acts 15:36-41 (from SBK Middle Primary Scripture)

- 1. Can you remember a time when you and friend/s made some good plans, but they didn't work out because people had different ideas? What did that feel like?**
Discuss how we can't always have our own way and this can cause problems even among the best of friends.
- 2. What plans were Paul and Barnabas making v36=38?**
To revisit places that they had visited so that they could encourage the new believers there.
- 3. It seemed a good idea to both of them - but what was the problem? (v 37-38).**
There was an argument over a person called John Mark who had walked out on them on a previous trip together.. Paul refused to take him on the trip.
- 4. John Mark was a cousin of Barnabas, and Barnabas had been a very good friend to Paul since Paul first met Jesus..**
Talk about how painful it must have been to have such a strong argument.
- 5. What solution did they reach (v39-40)?**
They went in different directions: Barnabas with John Mark to Cyprus (near Greece) and Paul with Silas towards modern Turkey.
- 6. How did God bring something good out of this hard problem?** The work of mission spread further! Now there were 2 journeys - and both 'teams' (Barnabas with John Mark and Paul with Silas), would have been sharing the Gospel and encouraging the Christians that they met.
- 7. Other parts of the New Testament tell us that Paul and Barnabas remained friends and that Paul came to think highly of John Mark again. What does this tell us ?** God has a place for every believer in his mission work - and he transforms those who have failed or who have acted angrily.
- 8. Like Paul and Barnabas, we are being changed by Jesus. We're not perfect - but God will still use us. .**
Talk about how we can ask God to help us to share the Good News.
- 9. What might we do if we need to sort out a problem in our friendship?**
For example:
 - We could try to see our friend's side of the argument.
 - There may be fault on our side - ask for forgiveness.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Read Acts 15:36-41 (from NIRV New Adventurer Bible)

- 1. Can you remember a time when you and friend/s made some good plans, but they didn't work out because people had different ideas? What did that feel like and what was the outcome?**
Discuss how we can't always have our own way and this can cause problems even among the best of friends.
- 2. What plans were Paul and Barnabas making v36=38?**
To revisit places that they had visited so that they could encourage the new believers there.
- 3. It seemed a good idea to both of them - but what was the problem?**
There was a conflict over a person called John Mark who had walked out on them on a previous trip together..
- 4. It must have been a painful disagreement (v 37-38).** especially as John Mark was a cousin of Barnabas, and Barnabas had been a mentor to Paul since his conversion..
Imagine the conversation together -
The children could divide into 2 groups, one representing Barnabas, the other Paul.
- 5. What solution did they reach (v39-40)?**
They went in different directions: Barnabas with John Mark to Cyprus (near Greece) and Paul with Silas towards modern Turkey.
- 6. How did God use this sharp disagreement for good?**
The work of mission multiplied. There were 2 journeys - and both 'teams', would have been sharing the Gospel and encouraging the Christians that they met.
- 7. Other parts of the New Testament tell us that Paul and Barnabas remained friends (1 Corinthians 9:6) and that Paul came to think highly of John Mark (Colossians 4:10 and Philemon v 23-24.**
What does this tell us ? God understands us more than we understand each other. He has a place for every believer in his mission work - and he transforms those who have failed or who have acted angrily.
- 8. Like Paul and Barnabas, we are being changed by Jesus. We're not perfect - but God will still use us.**
Talk about how we can ask God to help us to share the Good News.
- 9. What things might we do if we find ourselves arguing with our good friends?**
For example:
 - We could try to see our friend's side of the argument.
 - There may be fault on our side - ask for forgiveness.

YOU'LL NEED...

- Dot Stickers in four different colours to match the coloured hearts

STEPS

1. Blu tack the four heart printouts on the wall.

Paper Plate Boats

YOU'LL NEED...

- Paper plates
- Coloured paper for the sail cut into a triangle
- Paddle Pop Sticks
- Coloured Pencils, Crayons
- Scissors
- Sticky Tape

STEPS

1. Get the children to colour in the paper plate.
2. Fold the paper plate in half and make a small hole at the top in the middle.
3. Put the paddle pop stick through the hole and secure it with sticky tape.
4. Add the sail onto the paddle pop stick with tape.

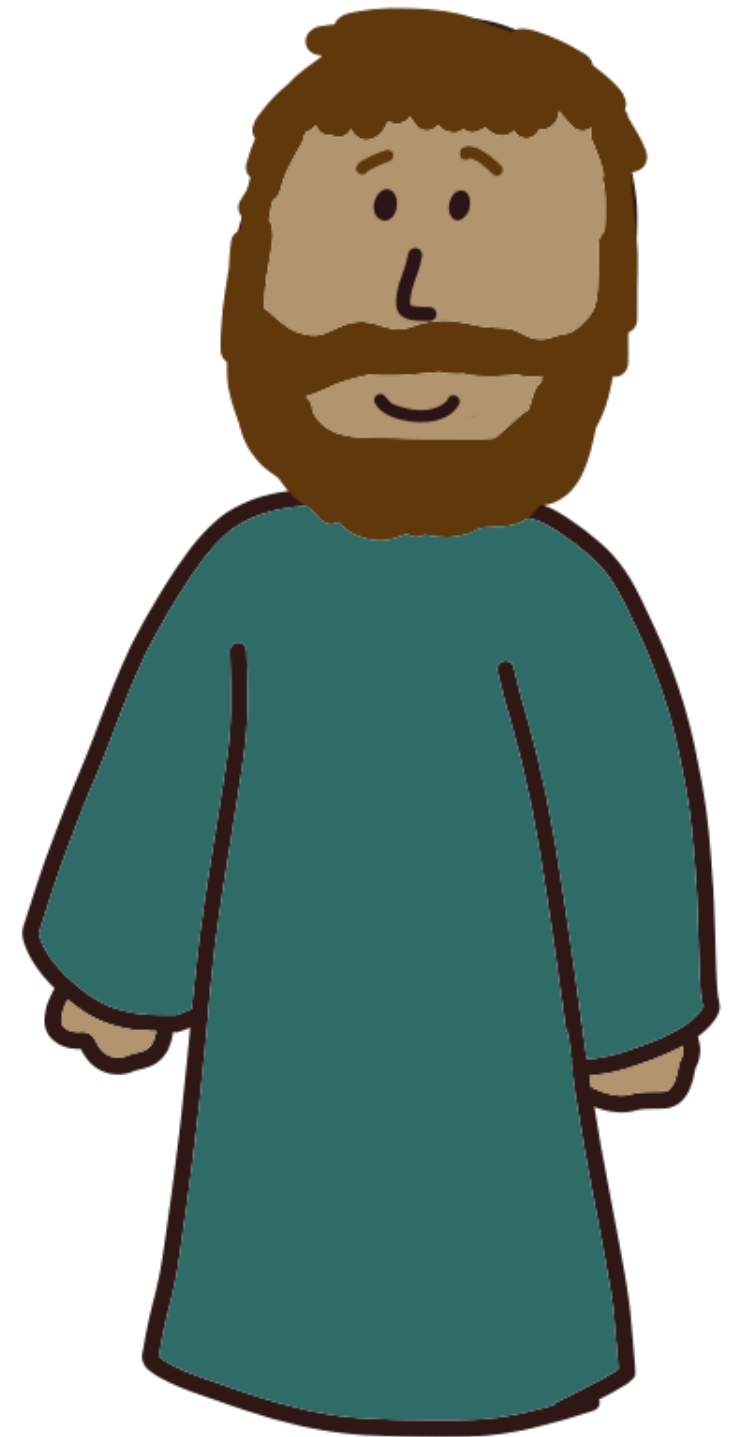
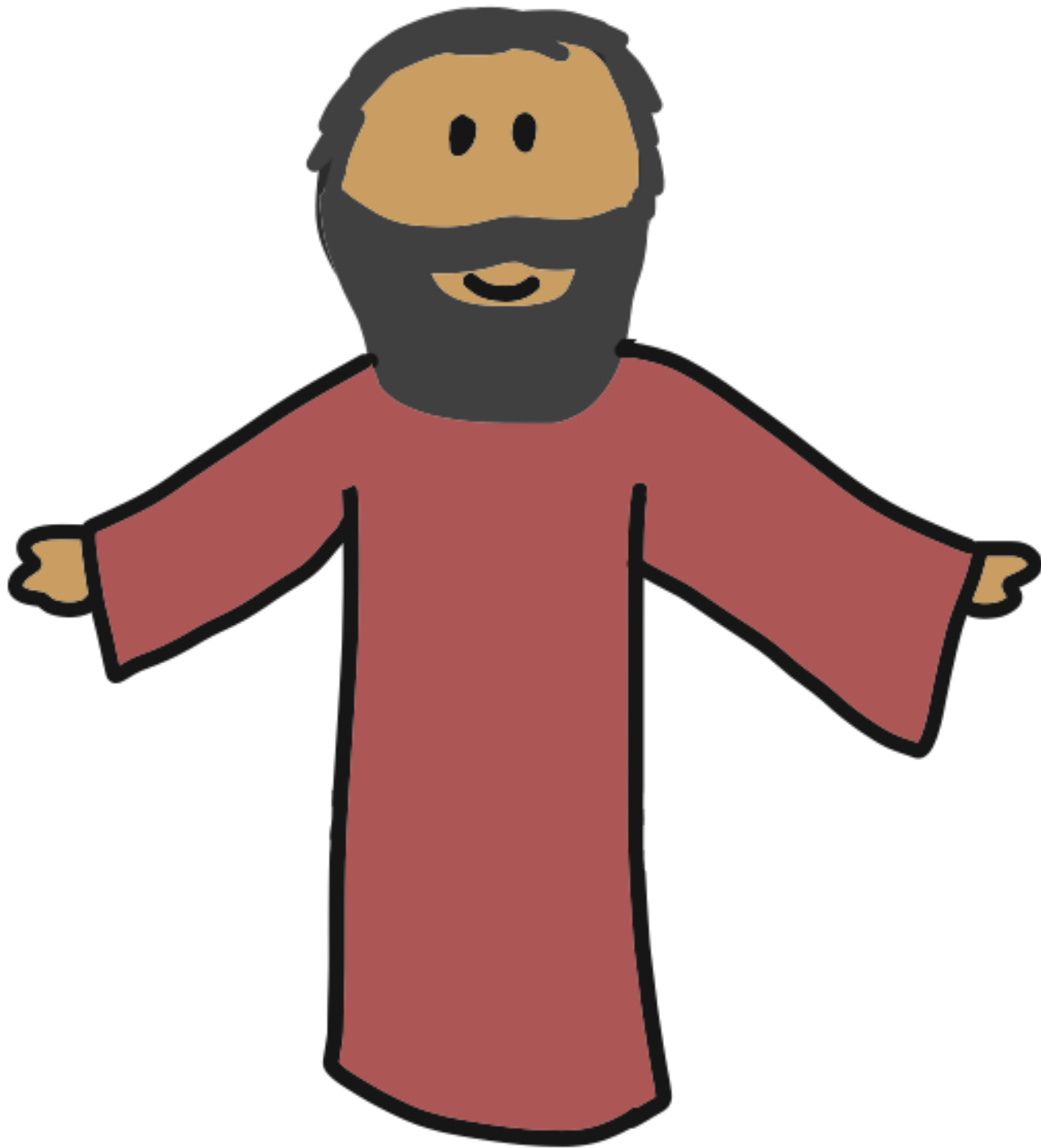
1. Simply print out images belonging to this week's passage (Acts 26:1-32), then laminate and cut them so they can be reused.

3. These puppets are great for children to use when someone is reading the story, or if the children are more confident, they could try retelling the story in their own words whilst using the puppets for support.

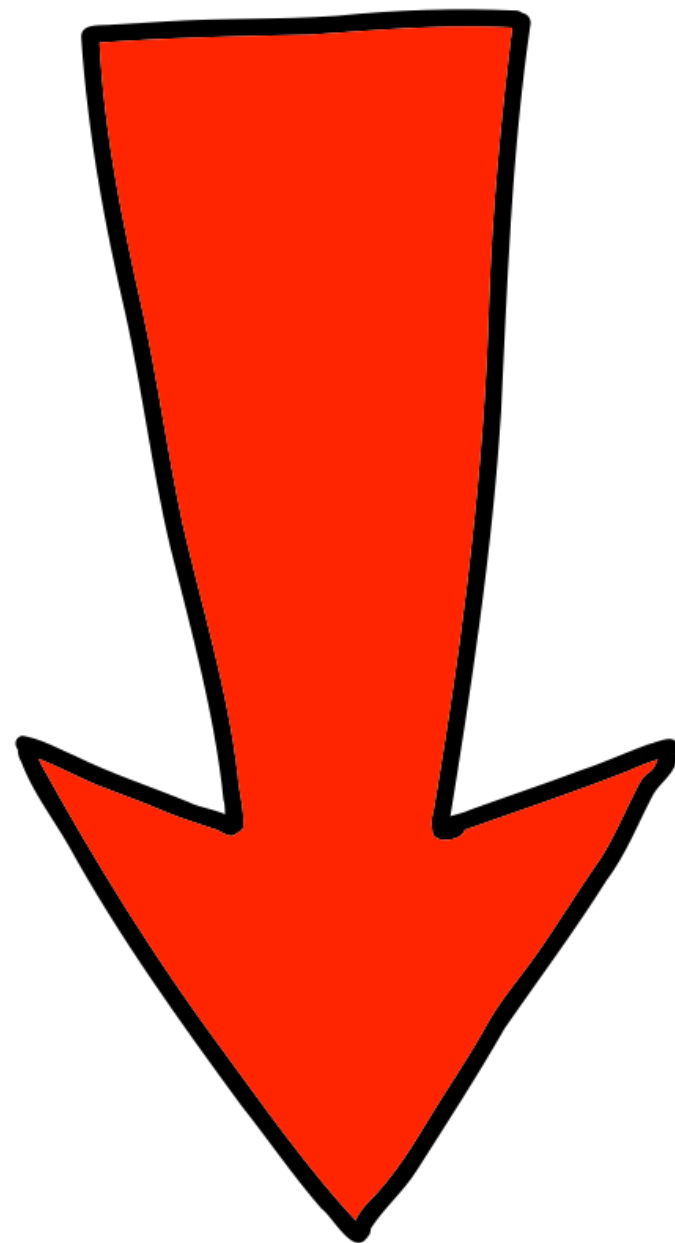
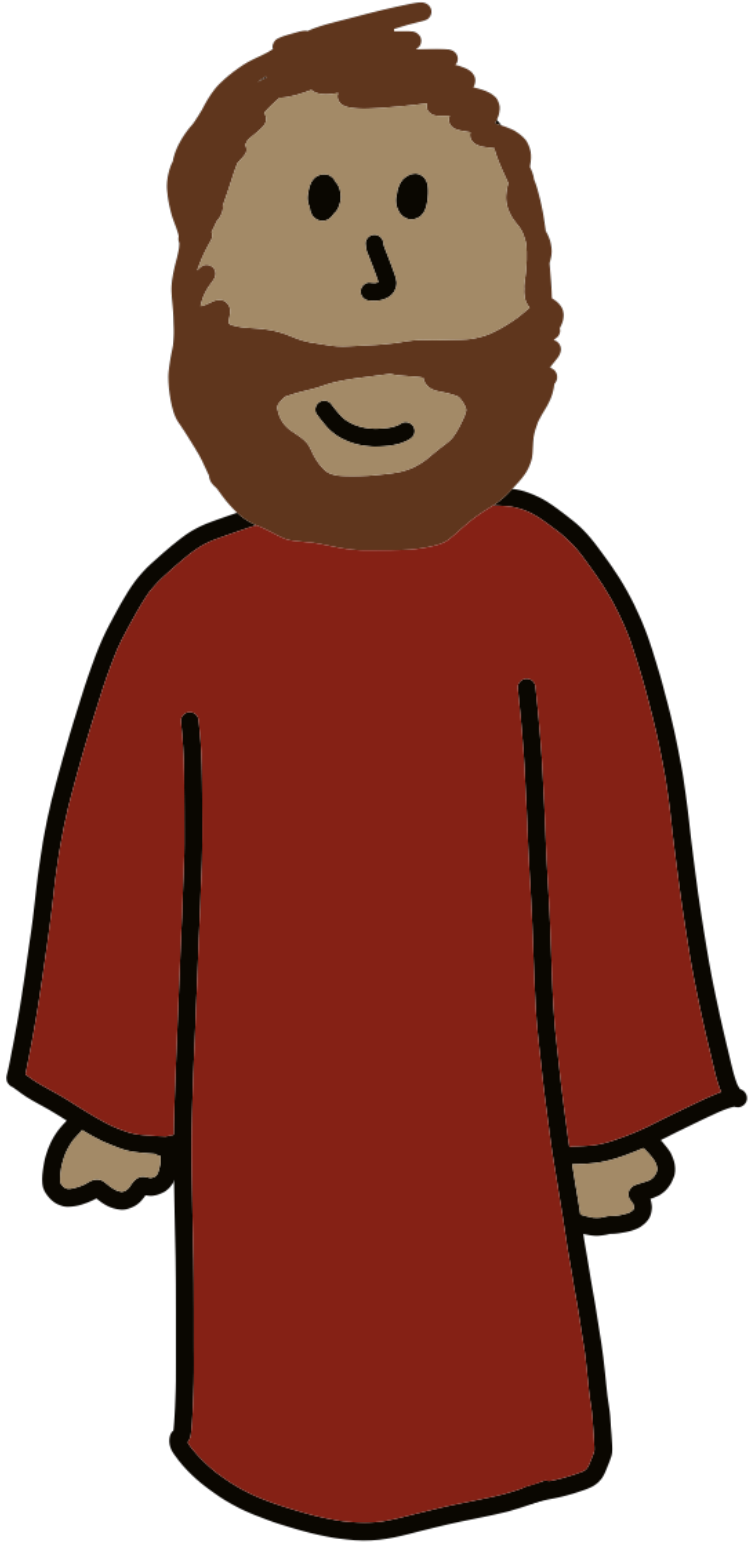


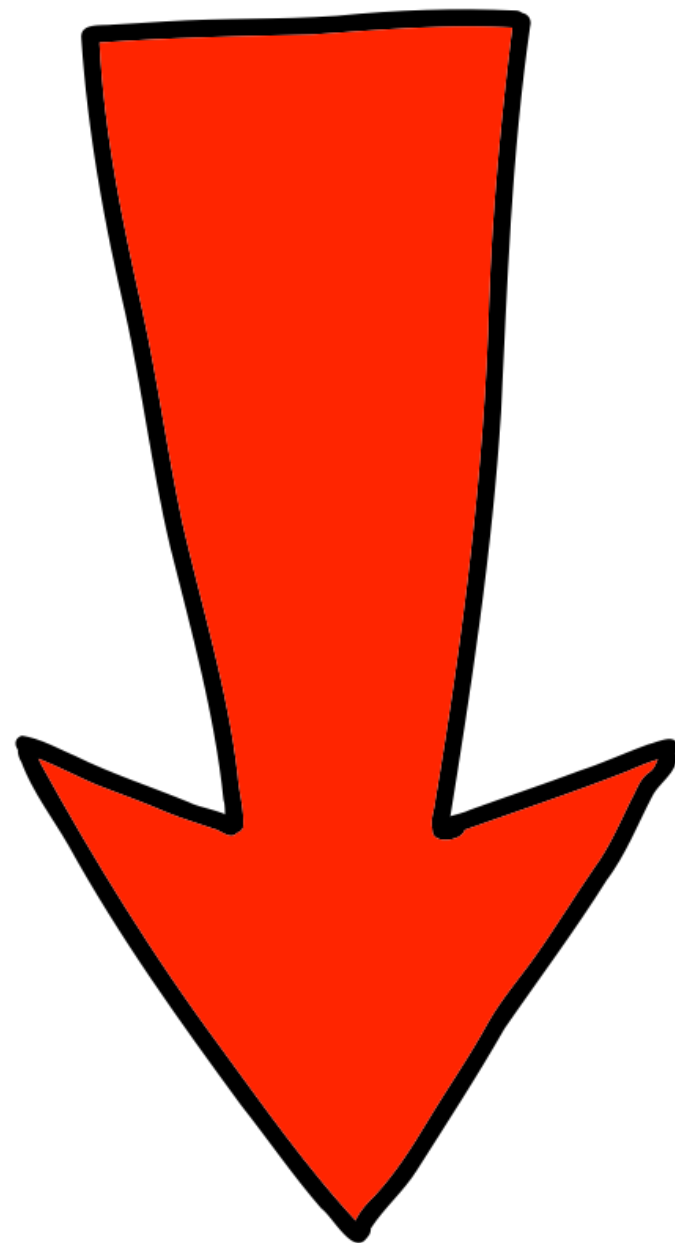
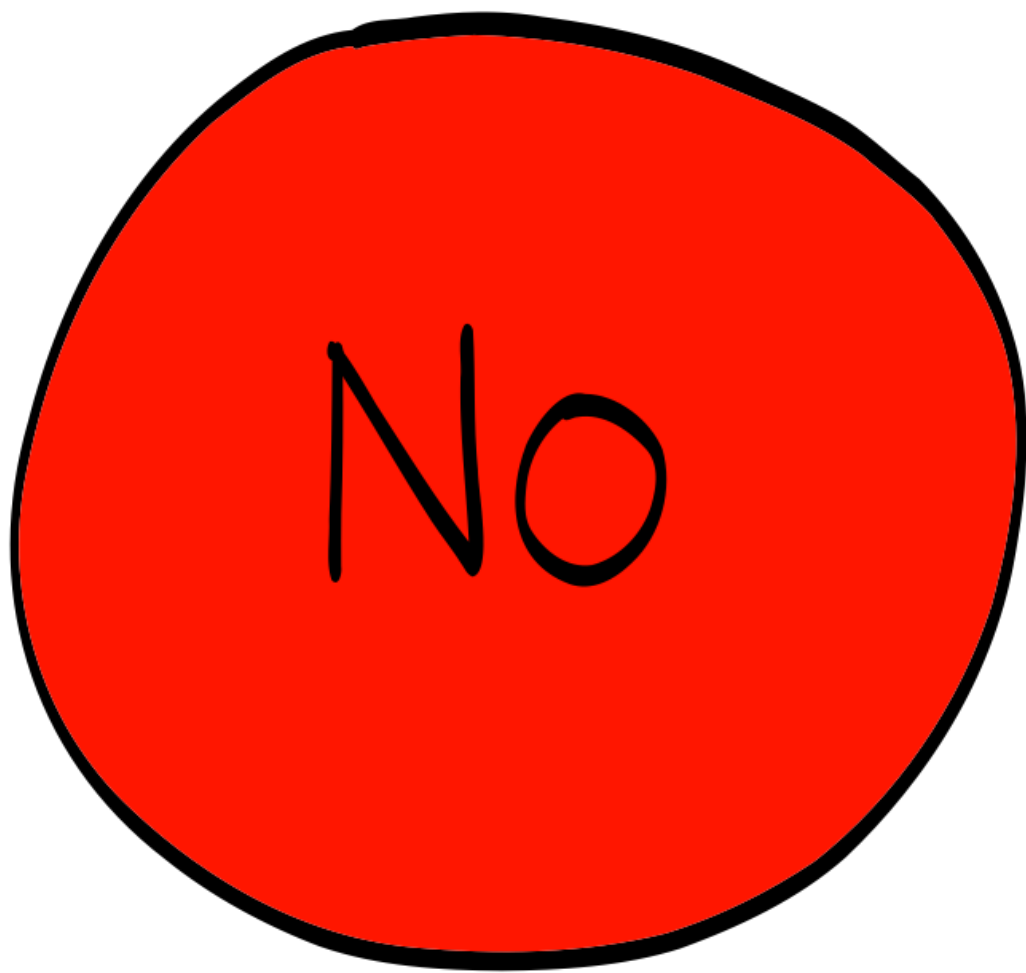

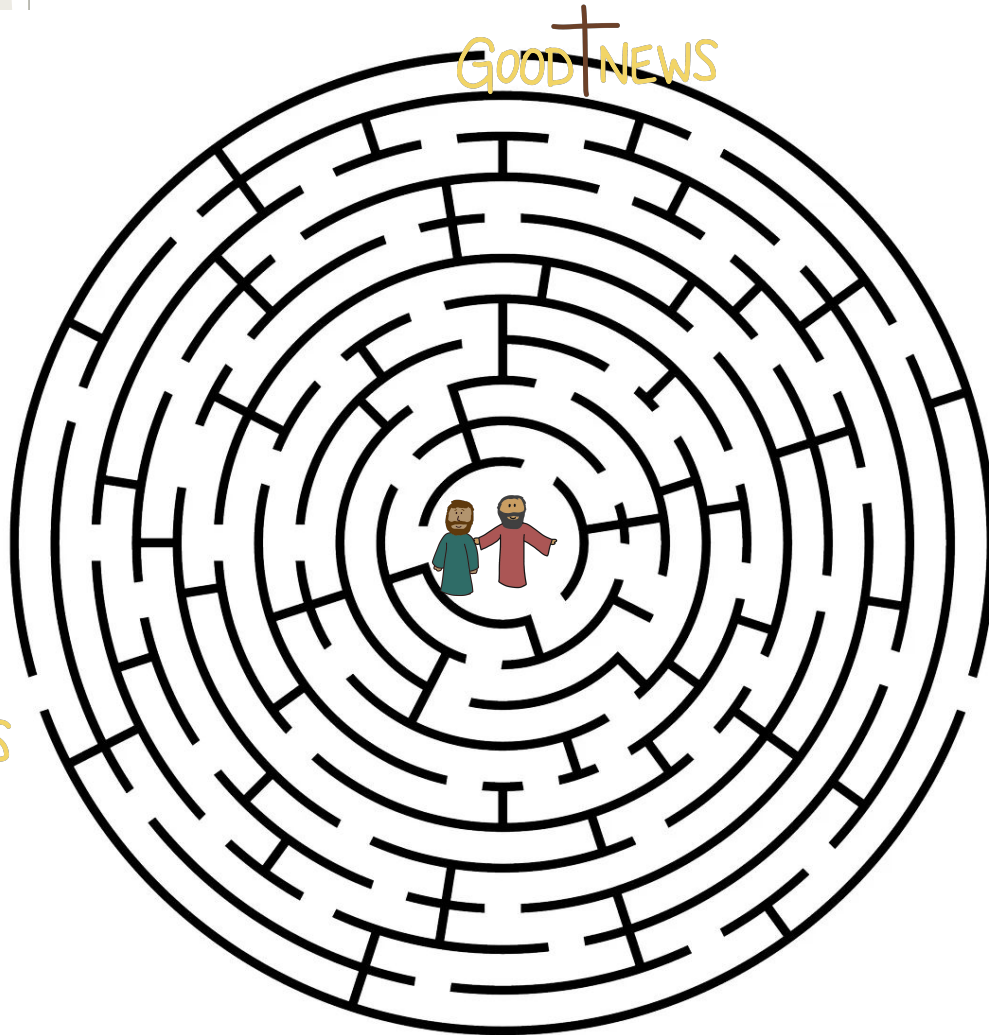

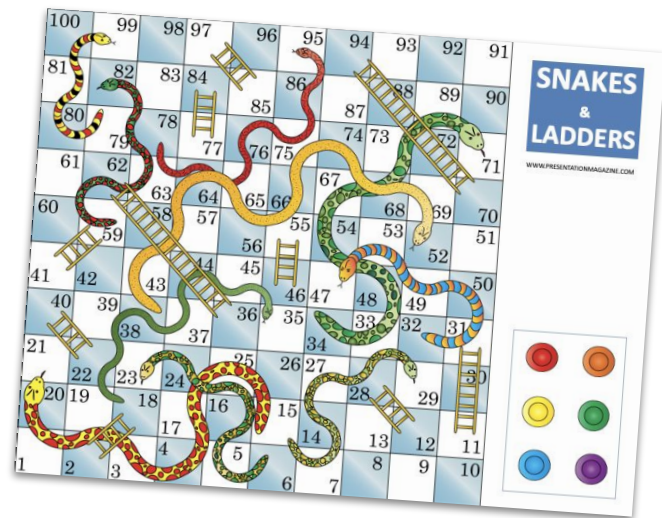
Snakes and Ladders

YOU'LL NEED...

- Snakes and Ladders gameboard
- Counters
- dice

STEPS

1. Have the children play in groups of 4-6.
2. All children place their markers on square 1.
3. The children take turns rolling the dice and moving that many squares forward.
4. If they land on a snake HEAD, they slide down the snake and land on the tail. If they land on the BOTTOM of a LADDER, they climb UP the ladder and land on the top square the ladder finishes.
5. Continue playing until one of the players reaches the '100' square.
6. Talk about how the snakes are like when we disagree poorly (in anger, annoyance, etc) and the ladders are the moments when we disagree with grace (with prayer, in love, with a shared common goal, etc).

There will be many moments in our life when we might disagree with others. But how we disagree is important - in love and in humility.

YOU'LL NEED...

- Printout of Worksheet #5
- counters

STEPS

1. Provide each child with a printout of Worksheet #5 (alternatively, use mini whiteboards and have each child draw a straight line across.
2. Read out the statements and ask the children to place their counter along the line, depending upon their opinion.
3. Once all children have made their choices, select some children to share their reasons why. Allow others to debate if they disagree.
4. Repeat for each of the statements listed.

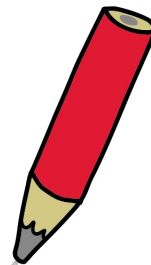
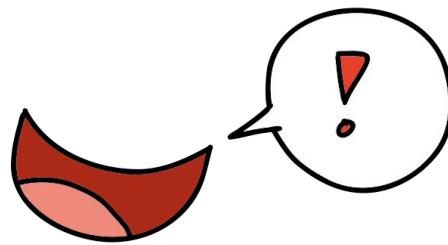
The Great Debate

YOU'LL NEED...

- Printout of Worksheet 5
- Clipboards
- Paper
- Pencils

STEPS

1. Have each child pair up with another.
2. Provide each pair with a different topic from Worksheet #5. One of the children is to be the 'affirmative' (agreeing with the statement); the other child is to be the 'negative' (disagreeing with the statement).
3. Give them 5 minutes to prepare some notes each and then have them present their debate. Emphasise that debaters always demonstrate great listening skills; one speaker at a time; no threatening or destructive words/attacking of the other debater, etc.

Paul and Barnabas were able to agree on the importance of sharing the Gospel, even if they disagreed on who they wanted to take along as their helper. Debating is one activity that helps provide a safe and healthy way of discussing and arguing different viewpoints, in a respectful manner.

GAME: Whisper Messages

YOU'LL NEED...

- Pre-prepared phrases relating to (or verses from) the weekly passage

STEPS

1. Children sit in a circle.
2. The leader whispers a phrase in the ear of the first kid in the circle.
3. They repeat the message to the third player, and so on.
4. When the last player is reached, they announce the message they heard to the entire group.
5. The leader then compares the original message with the final version.

GAME: Sit down if you...

YOU'LL NEED...

- Worksheet #6

STEPS

1. Have everyone stand up at the start of this game.
2. Read out each statement, one at a time. If an individual agrees with the statement, they are to sit down in their spot, leaving everyone else standing.
3. Continuing until all are sitting. Repeat the game with other statements, if time.

As you are playing this game, some strong opinions will come out and the children will naturally want to argue why they chose a particular viewpoint. Pick out 1-2 children each time to explain their opinion and try and foster an environment where we appreciate that we might not all agree on these matters, but we can still value and love each other (even if we don't understand or agree with their choices of opinion!).
